

His Wife Claims He Can Prove a  
Alibi.

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A Banner reporter had a talk to-day with Mr. W. B. Fischer, editor of the *Anzeiger Des Sundenis*, in regard to Adolph Fischer, arrested a few days ago at Chicago on the charge of throwing the bomb into the police ranks on the night of the riot. Mr. Fischer said it was true that the young man was his youngest brother. He came from the old country in 1877 and lived in St. Louis, where he married. In 1881, while Mr. Fischer was sick, Adolph came here and ran his paper about two months. After leaving here he went to Chicago, where he took the position of city editor on the *Arbeiter Zeitung*. Mr. Fischer said his brother was well educated and entertained radical opinions, but he did not believe he was guilty of the charges preferred against him and thought he could prove his innocence. Mr. Fischer received a letter from young Fischer's wife yesterday, and she says they will be able to prove an alibi. Mr. Fischer when asked if he did not dispense with his brother's services on account of his wanting to advocate socialism in the *Anzeiger Des Sudens*, said this was one reason, but he and his mother did not fall out on account of this. His mother preferred a larger city than Nashville, and this was mainly his reason for going to Chicago.
