### Ray, Willie to Speak At Springfield Feed.

SPRINGFIELD, Tenn. — (Sp) — Coach Ray Morrison, head tutor of the Vanderbilt University Commodores, and Capt. Willie Geny of the 1935 Vandy team will be the principal speakers at the annual football banquet of the Springfield High School Athletic Association to-night at 6 o'clock in the S. H. S. cafeteria.

The entire squad of some 25 Yellow Jackets will be honor guests at the feed, which will commemorate the wonderful record established by Coach W. Boyce Smith and his Springfield High eleven. The season's schedule included nine games, all won without a loss or tie and with 316 points scored to their opponents' 18. Seven games were won in the Little Ten Conference to virtually assure Springfield of the title over Lawrenceburg, which won only four games.

Scores of the season were: Du Pont High of Old Hickory, 13-6; Bell High of Adams, 60-0; Central High of Ashland City, 53-0; Franklin, 45-0; Columbia, 7-8; Clarksville, 19-6; Goodlettsville, 26-0; Central High of Murfreesboro, 53-0; Central High of Gallatin, 40-0. The crushing score against Murfreesboro Central and some of the other schools set all-time high records.
