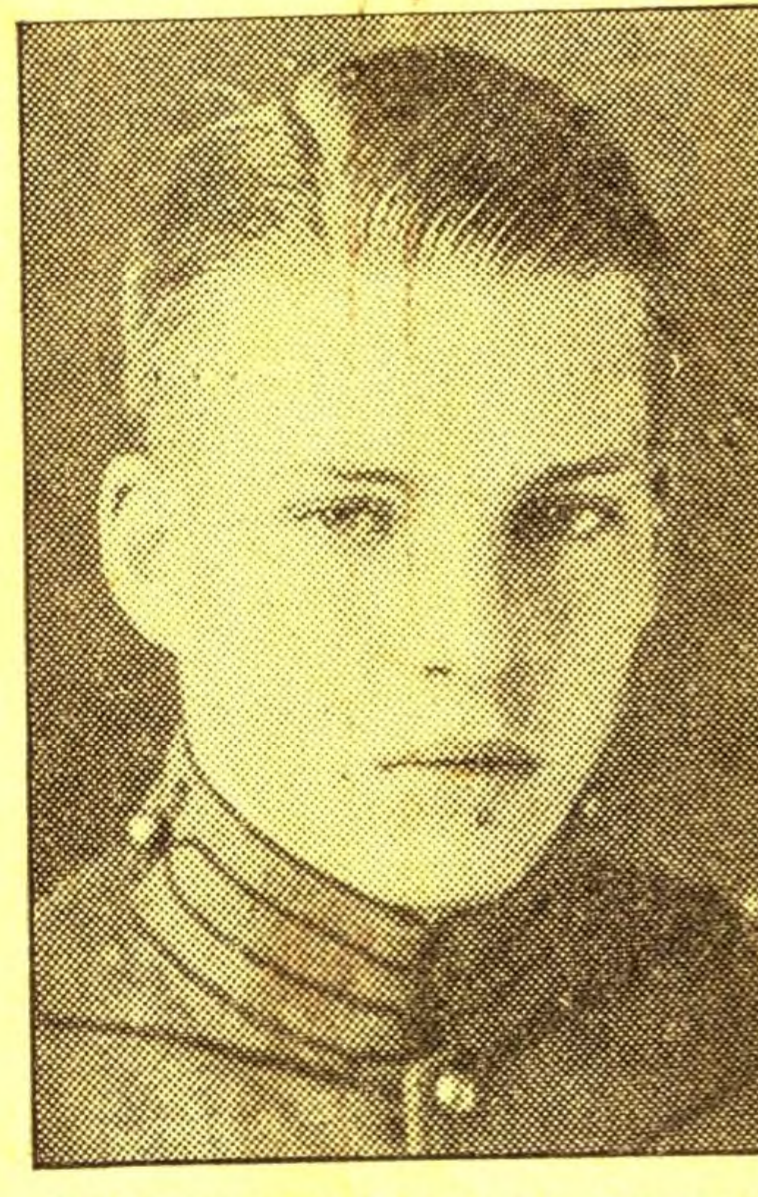

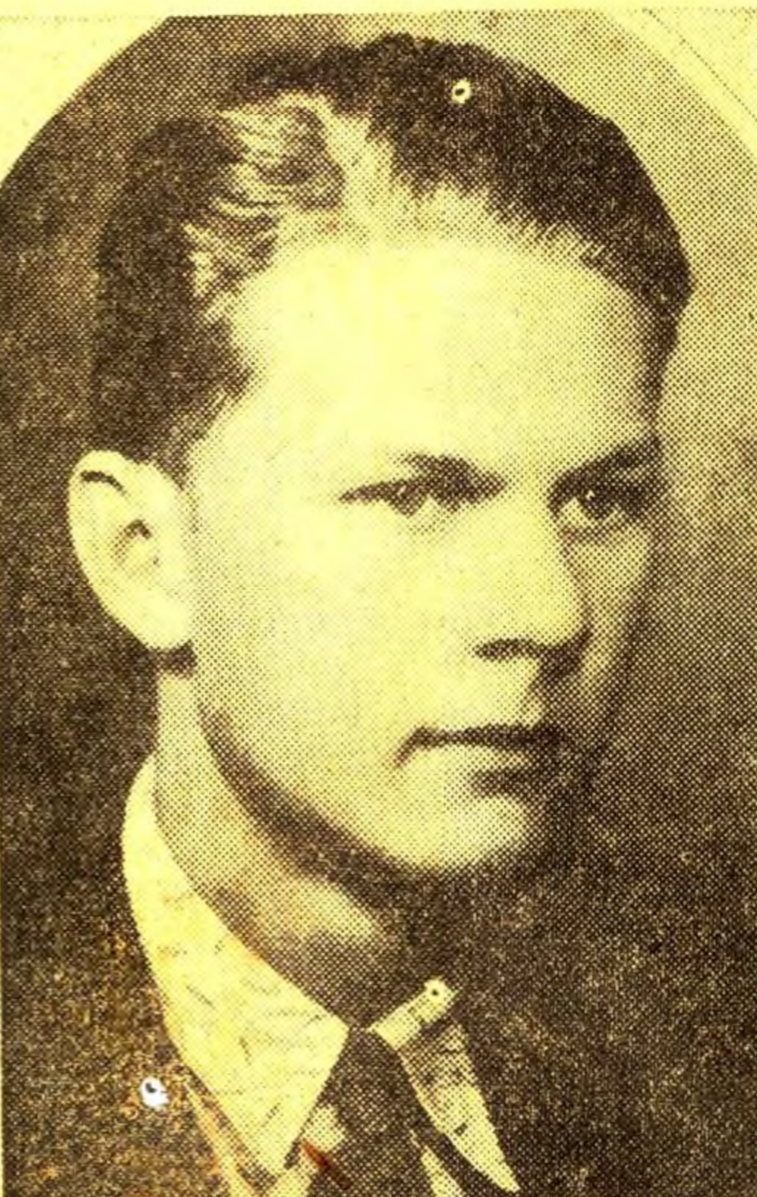

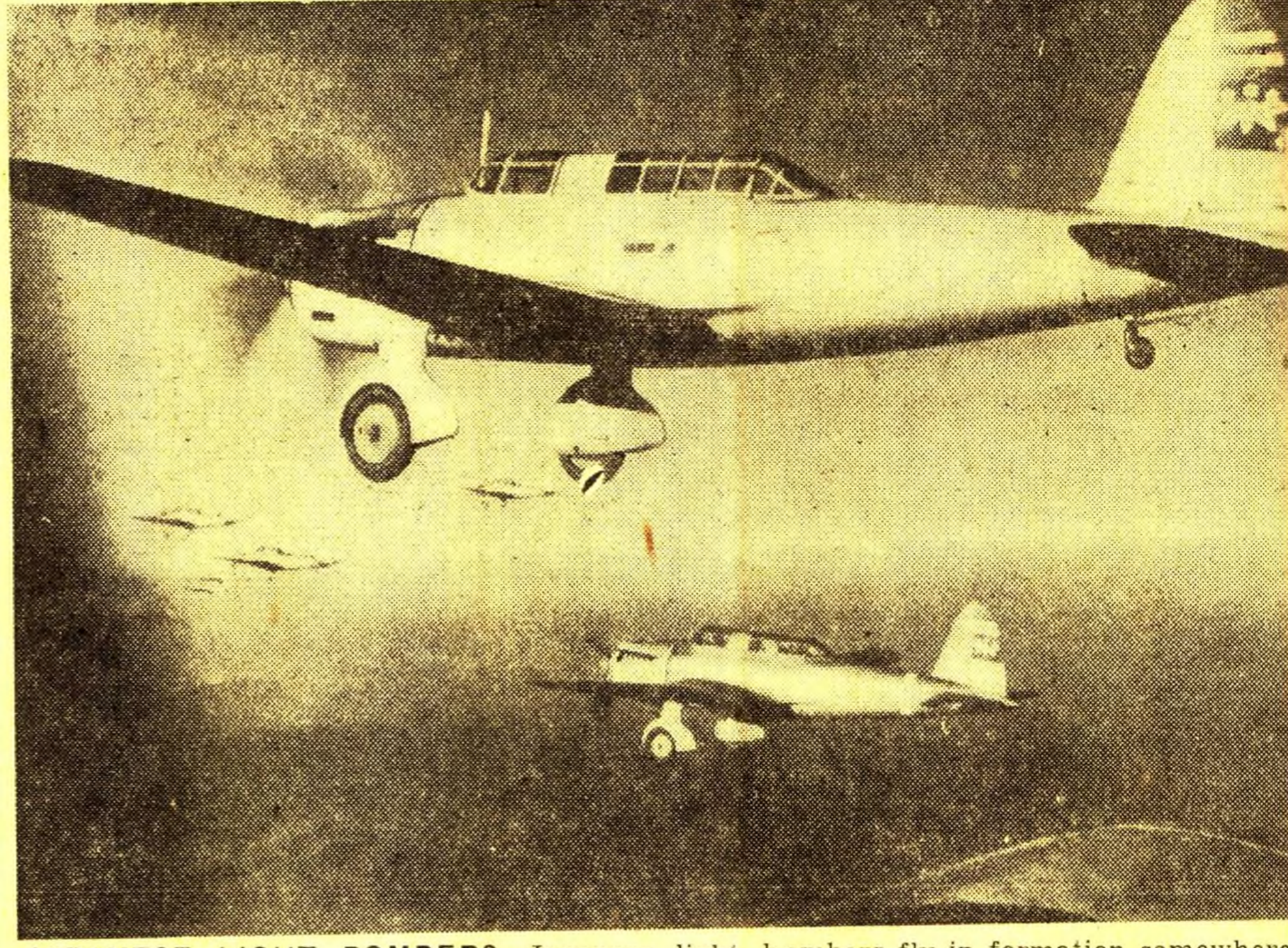

Majors, 1504 Seiger Street, Edwin, who is junior auditor for the Alexander Baldwin Company, pineapple and sugar shippers in Honolulu, has held that position for the past eleven years. He was last in Nashville in August, 1935. He was due to return to the United States next summer.

Tom Majors, a graduate of Hume-Fogg High School, was granted a football scholarship to the University of Hawaii three years ago. He is now connected with the Bishop Insurance Company on the Island of Maui in the Hawaiian group. Both of the Majors brothers have been heard from in the past week. Neither showed any sign of fear as to an outbreak in the Pacific.

Richard (Hop) O'Neal, son of Mrs. Kitty Hamilton and brother of Mrs. W. L. Pullen, 1919 Holly Street, is connected with the Young Transport Company in Honolulu. A graduate of Hume-Fogg High School, O'Neal has been in Hawaii for the past eight years. He was here on a visit to relatives last winter and was heard from about two weeks ago, relatives said. Blake Clark, son of T. B. Clark of Petersburg, teacher at Morgan School, is now a professor at the University of Hawaii, according to his cousin, Hiram Harris, of 712 Wedgewood Avenue. A native of Greenfield, Tenn., Clark attended Vanderbilt University and was in Nashville on a visit several months ago. He is the author of several books on Hawaii including "Paradise Limited," "O Mai," and "Oriental Influences on English Literature."

Harris, who attended the University of Hawaii, returned from that area in June and is now connected with General Shoe Corporation.

Dr. Clifford Braly, dentist in Honolulu and his wife, Mrs. Mary Catherine Davis Braly, formerly of Brentwood, are in the danger area, according to relatives here. Dr. Braly's brother, George; sister, Ellen; and daughter, Mrs. Pryor Lorraine, are also in Honolulu.

Mrs. Braly is the sister of G. A. Davis of 2400 Kirkman Lane, and the aunt of Mrs. J. B. Shacklett of the Kirkman Lane address; Mrs. R. W. Cisco of Woodmont Boulevard; W. Lipscomb Davis of Tyne Road; and D. C. Davis of Westover Drive.

Dr. Braly has been in Honolulu since 1917, and was last in this country in 1936. Prior to that time he was affiliated in dentistry with Dr. Boyd Bogle here. Mrs. Braly was in Nashville last year on a visit.

The last communication received from Mrs. Braly by Mrs. Cisco about two months ago stated that "Honolulu is not the same... it is all for defense and very depressed."

Mrs. Henslee Towell, the former Grace Baggett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Baggett of 2508 Franklin Road, is living in Honolulu, it was reported by relatives here. The wife of a defense engineer at Pearl Harbor, Mrs. Towell has been in Hawaii for the past seven years. She was last in Nashville about a year ago, relatives said. Her last letter to her family last week stated that "we are expecting trouble but we are well protected."

Pvt. Earl Pickel, Jr., son of Earl Pickel, Sr., superintendent of Brandon Auto Springs, Inc., 121 Thirtieth Avenue, North, is stationed with an infantry regiment at Schofield Barracks, Honolulu, it was learned today. A graduate of Ransom School, Earl, Jr., made his home with his parents at 1313 Straightway Avenue before enlisting for Army training at Fort Hamilton, N. Y.

The senior Pickel came to Nashville in 1929 after serving in the United States Army for eleven years at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. Earl, Jr., was born on the Texas Army post.

Lt. Steve Byers, brother of Ella Sue Byers of 3701 Harding Road, and son of Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Byers of Sikeston, Mo., formerly of Nashville, is stationed with the United States Army in Manila, it was learned here today.
